Dunn called the meeting to order at 12:02 p.m.

Approve Minutes from May 7, 2019 Meeting

Motion: Bucher moved, second by Pupp, to approve the minutes from the May 7, 2019 CJCC Anti-Human Trafficking Ad Hoc Committee meeting. Motion passed unanimously.

Update on Recent Anti-Human Trafficking Steering Committee Meeting and Define Committee's Scope of WorkDunn distributed and reviewed draft documents titled "Waukesha County Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force; Roles and Responsibilities; Approved [Date]; May 2019" and "Scope of Work."

Carter arrived at 12:05 p.m. Eiring arrived at 12:06 p.m. Mueller arrived at 12:09 p.m.

The committee agreed to define its "Scope of Work" as the following: Educating Waukesha's judicial officers, court practitioners, and criminal justice partners about the types and dynamics of human trafficking and the appropriate role of Waukesha County court systems in effectively identifying and addressing human trafficking in an empathetic, victim-focused manner.

Review & Consider Final Draft of Committee Goals

Dunn distributed and reviewed a document titled "Waukesha County Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force: Strategic Action Plan."

The committee agreed to make the following changes to the "Strategic Action Plan."

"Assess training needs" will be listed before "Educate the justice system"

The final version will be emailed to the committee.

Pupp commented that the Innovation Grant that the Prevention Workgroup had applied for was approved, so they will be moving forward to organize the "Ending the Game" training for up to 500 stakeholders.

The committee discussed conducting an environmental scan or system mapping process prior to developing a potential timeline for completion of identified goals and activities.

Dunn reported that Eric Calvino has reached out to Kenosha and Racine Counties (who have joined their task forces together), as well as Rock and Outagamie Counties regarding whether they have a Courts Pillar, but he has not heard back from them yet.

Dunn has heard back from the Director of the Milwaukee Academy who is willing to present to the committee at an upcoming meeting.

Carter commented that bench cards would be a good tool for the judiciary to refer to in cases that may involve human trafficking.

McMahon suggested contacting Erin Bostelman who used to work for Lad Lake, and is now in private practice.

Carter suggested connecting with the other pillars to see what they are covering for training so that the pillars can collaborate. At the June Steering Committee meeting, Dunn will talk to the other pillars to find out whom they are intending to train.

Dunn and Eiring will forward recent articles on human trafficking that they have found. Gibson will check with the State Department to see if they have any information on human trafficking.

Dunn commented that part of the mapping process could include what happens when human trafficking is suspected but not confirmed.

Pupp mentioned that there might be multiple tracks to map, as the committee needs to consider juveniles separate from adults and sex trafficking separate from other types of trafficking – such as labor or drugs.

Other Items for Discussion

There were no other items for discussion.

Discuss Agenda Items for Next Meeting

- Develop and discuss a set of questions to ask willing survivors of human trafficking regarding their legal experience.
- Future meetings will be held the first Tuesday of the month.
