RISK MANAGEMENT ANALYST

FUNCTION OF THE JOB

Under supervision, to perform work involving the daily administration and implementation of a countywide worker's compensation claims program and loss prevention and control efforts; and to perform other duties as required.

CHARACTERISTIC DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Reviews and implements specific aspects of the worker's compensation claims process and makes recommendations to ensure the continuation of proper record keeping and reporting activities.
- 2. Establishes and maintains worker's compensation claims files and documents claims activity.
- 3. Assists the third-party administrator with claims investigation, monitors the employee's return to work schedule and maintains records of any subrogation efforts.
- 4. Researches and prepares supporting documentation for the negotiation and settlement of contested worker's compensation claims.
- 5. Compiles and reviews third party billing and claims summary reports to identify any unusual activity or erroneous claims.
- 6. Conducts on-site inspections of County facilities to document and analyze existing hazards; provides recommendation for corrective action.
- 7. Reviews injury reports for completeness and accuracy of information; documents safety concerns and monitors compliance with corrective action plan.
- 8. Monitors safety and health programs and policies to ensure compliance with recommendations to reduce workplace hazards.
- 9. Interprets and communicates existing safety laws and regulations and any policy, procedures or program changes to a variety of employees.
- 10. Serves on safety committees and may assist with the research and development of loss prevention measures, loss control services, and safety and health programs.
- 11. Maintains and presents reports on worker's compensation claims history, safety and health issues, loss prevention measures and other program efforts.
- 12. Establishes and maintains effective working relationships with employees at all levels of the County, County Board committees, medical providers, attorneys, government agencies and the general public.
- 13. Conducts training on the County's safety and health programs, maintains accurate records and prepares reports.
- 14. Performs other duties as required.

QUALIFICATIONS

Essential Knowledge and Abilities

- 1. Working knowledge of current principles and practices used in worker's compensation and loss prevention and control administration.
- 2. Working knowledge of federal and state laws and regulations governing the administration and processing of worker's compensation claims.
- 3. Working knowledge of health and safety principles, practices, and regulations.
- 4. Some knowledge of computerized department program software, Internet access, and database, and spreadsheet and word processing programs.
- 5. Ability to utilize word processing, database and spreadsheet programs.
- 6. Ability to administer and implement programs, policies and procedures.
- 7. Ability to maintain an on-going and varied workload.

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QUALIFICATIONS

Essential Knowledge and Abilities (continued)

- 8. Ability to plan, organize and effectively carry out a variety of assignments.
- 9. Ability to collect and analyze summary reports and other data and to prepare recommendations.
- 10. Ability to establish and maintain files, records, reports and detailed documentation.
- 11. Ability to travel to off-site locations within the County to perform claims investigations and loss prevention and control activities under varying weather conditions and physical terrains.
- 12. Ability to communicate effectively both orally and in writing in group settings and on one-on-one basis.
- 13. Ability to establish and maintain effective working relationships with employees at all levels of the County, County Board committees, medical providers, attorneys, government agencies and the general public.
- 14. Ability to effectively interact with sensitivity with persons from diverse cultural, socioeconomic, educational, racial, ethnic, and professional backgrounds, and persons of all ages and lifestyles.
- 15. Ability to conduct a visual and auditory assessment and inspection of conditions at varying site locations.

Training and Experience

1. Graduation from a recognized college or university with a bachelor's degree in risk management, occupational safety, business administration, public administration, or a closely related area.

OR

Four (4) years of progressively responsible work experience in the area of administering worker's compensation claims and safety programs.
